

Pearls in Proverbs Lesson #6

Commit your works to the LORD, And your thoughts will be established.

- The Hebrew word translated 'commit' literally means 'to roll'.
 - Roll, or bring, all of your works to the Lord.
 - Seek His approval through His word.
 - Ask Him to bless your efforts.
 - Remember to see all that you do as a part of the big picture.

The LORD has made all for Himself, Yes, even the wicked for the day of doom.

- Rev 4:11
- There are no loose ends in God's world; everything will be put to some use matched to it's appropriate fate.
- The application to us is that we too were each fearfully and wonderfully made in His image with a purpose in mind. (The Purpose Driven Life is re-make of an old story)
- The question of the ages is 'will we embrace His purpose for us or will we fight Him?'.

When a man's ways please the LORD, He makes even his enemies to be at peace with him.

- The best way to peace in the horizontal is to have peace in the vertical.
 - Math 6:33 'Seek ye first the kingdom of God and His righteousness and all these things will be added unto you.
 - You will never be in a better position to be close with other people than when you are close to God.

It is better to be poor and godly than rich and dishonest. (NLT)

- The philosophy of our culture:
 - Better to have things than faith.
 - If you don't get caught, it must be legal.
 - Our culture places little value on honesty.
- The truth tells us:
 - Better to have faith than things.
 - What we do in this life echoes in eternity.

There is a way that seems right to a man, But its end is the way of death.

- Cain thought he had a better way.
- Achan thought he knew better.
- Pharisees of Jesus' day thought that they were on track.
- Every cult know to man thinks they have a better path to God.
- Common error; all are rooted in the works of man as opposed to the work of God on our behalf.

He who is slow to anger is better than the mighty,

And he who rules his spirit than he who takes a city.

James 1:19-20

 Both parts of the proverb point out that self control is a powerful force in the life of the one who possesses it.

 Clear, deliberate, unagitated thinking serves us better than brute strength. This is certainly key to the martial arts.

Better is a dry morsel with quietness, Than a house full of feasting with strife.

Two kinds of feasts:

- One is the kind where you have some simple food and great fellowship with others of like faith.
- The other is the kind where the food must impress and the drink must be plenty in order for the attendees to claim a good time.
- One is driven by the eternal and the other by the temporal.

The refining pot is for silver and the furnace for gold,

But the LORD tests the hearts.

- The fact the Lord tests our hearts makes Him our judge, but equally true is His role as the refiner.
 - His tests are never without a purpose.
 - God does not test us to fail us, He tests us to make us better.
 - Not all dross is inherently bad; Ezek 22:18

An evildoer gives heed to false lips;

A liar listens eagerly to a spiteful tongue. .

- When people speak ill of another, gossip, or backbite; our response either helps or hurts the situation.
 - Ever try to damage someone with your words and had cold water thrown on your intentions simply because the hearer would not hear you?
 - Simply not cooperating with such talk is a powerful weapon against it.
 - Proverbs 26:20

He who covers a transgression seeks love, But he who repeats a matter separates friends

- Peacemaker or troublemaker?
 - While there are some sins that should not be covered, there are many that should be. (see James 5:20 principle)
 - In most cases, God does not appoint us to be the 'fault announcer'.
 - On the other hand, if you want to stir up trouble and be a tool of the enemy then, by all means, lend him your mouth. (a junior high mentality is evil in the church)

He who justifies the wicked, and he who condemns the just, Both of them alike are an abomination to the LORD.

 When we justify the wicked or condemn the just our actions are loathed by the Lord.

 Both are exactly counter to His intentions and both will be corrected in time to come.

 However, is not Calvary a picture of the very acts described?

A friend loves at all times,

And a brother is born for adversity.

 If you want to know who your real friends are, take a headcount when times are tough.

Ever hear the term 'fair weather friends'?

 Family is supposed to be there for you no matter what and is part of God's designed support plan.

He who has a deceitful heart finds no good, And he who has a perverse tongue falls into evil.

 There are some who assume that if they do not usually do good, then others do not either.

 These are the same that see a hidden selfish motive behind every act of kindness.

The clinical term for this is I SEE MY FAULT IN YOU!

Even a fool is counted wise when he holds his peace;

When he shuts his lips, he is considered perceptive.

- This works no matter where it is tried. Peter used to speak of things he did not understand just because he felt he had to say something. (Math 9:5-6)
- People usually give us the benefit of the doubt that we know what we are doing unless we tell them otherwise.
- Better to be suspected as a fool than to open your mouth and remove all doubt.

A man who isolates himself seeks his own desire;

He rages against all wise judgment.

- There is a great temptation for Christians to want to withdraw from the world because of sin.
- However, such a move is really selfish one.
- Sure it would be easier for us to live apart from the world, but it would not be good for the world.
- There is a fine line between being separated and being isolated. (John 17:15-18)

He who is slothful in his work

Is a brother to him who is a great destroyer.

- It is a sin to destroy resources that God supplies to you or others. That is a waste.
- The person who fiddles around when he should be working is put into the same category because he is wasting the resources of time, talent, and energy.
- We have finite amounts of time, talent, and energy and we ought not to waste these gifts from God. Some might call this a sin of omission. (James 4:17)

The name of the LORD is a strong tower;

The righteous run to it and are safe.

- The world thinks that the unseen is the unreal, but it is the natural man who needs a vivid imagination to feel safe.
- His 'name' (all that He is) gives us strong reasons to feel secure. (omniscience, omnipresence, omnipotence)
- The righteous understand that the Lord is not 'an' option for security, but 'the' option.

The rich man's wealth is his strong city,

And like a high wall in his own esteem.

- On the other hand, those who trust in their riches see their money as their security.
- Sadly, all that we can see and touch supports this Money can buy a measure of temporal security, and a greater measure of healthcare, etc ...
- They believe that their money is keeping them safe and secure, but all of this avoids the most serious threat to their well being that they face; sin.

He who answers a matter before he hears it,

It is folly and shame to him.

- The sin of a fast mouth Or maybe it's the sin of not listening.
- How would you like to be judged by someone who has not heard all of the facts?
- When we jump to conclusions we show our pride and arrogance. How dare we think we know things before we are told?
- Let us not avoid making judgments, but avoid making uninformed judgments.

The spirit of a man will sustain him in sickness,

But who can bear a broken spirit?

- A positive and faithful attitude is a powerful weapon when fighting sickness.
- For the believer, it is even more effective because we have solid reasons to be positive and optimistic. (Even if the worst happens, we get promoted.)
- Broken spirits were not intended to be endured, they are intended to draw us to our burden bearer.

The first one to plead his cause seems right,

Until his neighbor comes and examines him.

- There are always (2) sides to every story.
- This is why we do not entertain gossip.
- Believing a one sided account is likely to make you look stupid.
- This is why our courts allow for both sides of a story to be presented.

Death and life are in the power of the tongue,

And those who love it will eat its fruit.

- Faith comes by hearing and hearing by the word of God. (Rom 10:17) This, of course, is the ultimate argument for this truth.
- As a practical matter, what others say about us can have a huge impact on our lives.
- Let us weigh our words because they are very powerful and can have lasting consequences.

Drunkenness

- Wine is a mocker, strong drink is raging: and whosoever is deceived thereby is not wise.
- Be not among winebibbers; among riotous eaters of flesh:
- Who hath woe? who hath sorrow? who hath contentions? who hath babbling? who hath wounds without cause? who hath redness of eyes?
- They that tarry long at the wine; they that go to seek mixed wine.
- Look not thou upon the wine when it is red, when it giveth his colour in the cup, when it moveth itself aright.
- At the last it biteth like a serpent, and stingeth like an adder.
- Thine eyes shall behold strange women, and thine heart shall utter perverse things.
- Yea, thou shalt be as he that lieth down in the midst of the sea, or as he that lieth upon the top of a mast
- They have stricken me, shalt thou say, and I was not sick; they have beaten
 me, and I felt it not: when shall I awake? I will seek it yet again

Ethics

- A false balance is abomination to the LORD: but a just weight is his delight.
- A just weight and balance are the LORD's: all the weights of the bag are his work.
- It is naught, it is naught, saith the buyer: but when he is gone his way, then he boasteth.20:23Divers weights are an abomination unto the LORD; and a false balance is not good.
- The getting of treasures by a lying tongue is a vanity tossed to and fro of them that seek death.
- Remove not the ancient landmark, which thy fathers have set.
- Remove not the old landmark; and enter not into the fields of the fatherless:
- For their redeemer is mighty; he shall plead their cause with thee.
