Lesson #9
God is Sovereign

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Rom 9:10-17

This son was our ancestor Isaac. When he married Rebekah, she gave birth to twins. 11 But before they were born, before they had done anything good or bad, she received a message from God. (This message shows that God chooses people according to his own purposes; 12 he calls people, but not according to their good or bad works.) She was told, "Your older son will serve your younger son." 13 In the words of the Scriptures, "I loved Jacob, but I rejected Esau." 14 Are we saying, then, that God was unfair? Of course not! 15 For God said to Moses, "I will show mercy to anyone I choose, and I will show compassion to anyone I choose." 16 So it is God who decides to show mercy. We can neither choose it nor work for it. 17 For the Scriptures say that God told Pharaoh, "I have appointed you for the very purpose of displaying my power in you and to spread my fame throughout the earth."

Rom 9:18-24

18 So you see, God chooses to show mercy to some, and he chooses to harden the hearts of others so they refuse to listen. 19 Well then, you might say, "Why does God blame people for not responding? Haven't they simply done what he makes them do?" 20 No, don't say that. Who are you, a mere human being, to argue with God? Should the thing that was created say to the one who created it, "Why have you made me like this?" 21 When a potter makes jars out of clay, doesn't he have a right to use the same lump of clay to make one jar for decoration and another to throw garbage into? 22 In the same way, even though God has the right to show his anger and his power, he is very patient with those on whom his anger falls, who were made for destruction. 23 He does this to make the riches of his glory shine even brighter on those to whom he shows mercy, who were prepared in advance for glory.

A neglected chapter of the Bible.

- Romans 9 is a great chapter of the Bible, but is often avoided because we have trouble fitting its message into our tidy doctrinal packages.
- ☐ Romans 9 speaks of things we find hard to accept for just one reason we are not God.
- ☐ We should not afford ourselves the luxury of picking and choosing what we want God to be like when it is all too obvious He is perfect as He is.

A neglected chapter of the Bible.

- Our corrupt sense of fairness recoils at God choosing Jacob to rule over his brother Esau when neither one had yet made a mistake (Esau) or had done well enough to merit such elevation (Jacob).
- □ We think God to be capricious and arbitrary in his selection of Jacob and we don't know what to do with that.
- ☐ It often does not fit our template for how God is supposed to behave.

A neglected chapter of the Bible.

- □ My 30,000 foot conclusions from Romans 9 are −
 - ☐God is still everything else we know Him to be and so much more.

- ☐ He will not allow Himself to be limited to what we approve or are able to comprehend.
- ☐ Who are we to question God he is not in the wrong because I don't happen to understand his workings.

Nebuchadnezzar

□ Dan 5:21 He was driven from human society. He was given the mind of a wild animal, and he lived among the wild donkeys. He ate grass like a cow, and he was drenched with the dew of heaven, until he learned that the Most High God rules over the kingdoms of the world and appoints anyone he desires to rule over them.

□ God is not limited to the choices we give Him nor by the circumstances we create.

Kings, Politicians, and Presidents

□ Ps 75:5-7 Don't raise your fists in defiance at the heavens or speak with such arrogance.'" 6 For no one on earth—from east or west, or even from the wilderness— should raise a defiant fist. 7 It is God alone who judges; he decides who will rise and who will fall.

☐ Prov 21:1 The king's heart is like a stream of water directed by the Lord; he guides it wherever he pleases.

God is in control?

☐ There is a chorus I love to sing with the words, "God is control He's determined His children will not be forsaken", but is it true?

☐ God is sovereign, God is in charge, God has authority over all, but is He in control?

☐ I say not in the way we usually think where He is assigned the role of puppet master.

God is in control?

We sometimes treat Him as though He were our personal vending machine or genie.

□ We pray for parking spaces, for our teams to win, for good weather for our vacations, and other silly things.

□ The question is not whether God can or cannot provide all of those – the question is why would He? (goes to our motive)

□ John 9:1 As Jesus was walking along, he saw a man who had been blind from birth. 2 "Rabbi," his disciples asked him, "why was this man born blind? Was it because of his own sins or his parents' sins?" 3 "It was not because of his sins or his parents' sins," Jesus answered. "This happened so the power of God could be seen in him."

□ Another scripture that we have trouble grasping – the man was 38 years old, and he was born blind specifically so that God's power could be see in him.

"The meaning of Jesus in John 9:3 is not obscure. He is saying to the disciples: Turn away from your fixation on causality as the decisive explanation of suffering. And turn away from any surrender to futility, or absurdity, or chaos, or meaninglessness. And turn to the purposes and plans of God. There is no child and no suffering outside God's purposes." John Piper

☐ When we suffer is it not hidden from God and He is able to bring beauty from some of life's ugliest ashes.

- □ There is a condition to be met in order for our suffering to be meaningful and valuable to us we must first see His glory as more important than our present circumstances.
- ☐ It is clear from the text that Jesus thought God's glory was a sufficient explanation for 38 years of blindness.
- ☐ The fact that many of us have trouble with the "God's glory" explanation reveals our weak perspective.

- □ This light momentary affliction is preparing for us an eternal weight of glory beyond all comparison, as we look not to the things that are seen but to the things that are unseen. For the things that are seen are transient, but the things that are unseen are eternal" (2 Corinthians 4:17-18.
- ☐ We are handicapped in our view of eternity and therefore in our evaluation of eternal things.
- □ We do not always comprehend the true value of our present conditions what we think is good if often not best.

□ All that we hold dear is held together and made possible by the sovereignty of our God.

☐ By definition, sovereignty is having supreme and ultimate rank, power, and authority.

☐ If God is not sovereign then he is not God.

□ None of us would want to spend one minute in a world that has no Sovereign God.

- □ No one is born loving the sovereignty of God we are all born presuming and assuming our own sovereignty.
- ☐ Just as difficult times make us more spiritual, they also tend to make us lovers (and wanters) of His sovereignty.
- □ The question is this will we believe what the Bible teaches about our God even if it is way over our heads, or will we settle for only those things we can reason?

Point to Ponder

And the Lord said, in effect, "I will not simply be analyzed, I will be adored. I will not simply be pondered, I will be proclaimed. My sovereignty is not simply to be scrutinized, it is to be heralded. It is not grist for the mill of controversy, it is gospel for sinners who know that their only hope is the sovereign triumph of God's grace over their rebellious will." John Piper
