No One Seeks For God

- Psalm 14:2 The Lord looks down from heaven on the children of man, to see if there are any who understand, who seek after God. 3 They have all turned aside; together they have become corrupt; there is none who does good, not even one. (sounds like no one is seeking)
- Romans 3:10b "None is righteous, no, not one; 11 no one understands; no one seeks for God. 12 All have turned aside; together they have become worthless; no one does good, not even one."

No One Seeks For God

- Contrary to what many may believe, the world is not filled with people seeking God – they may be trying to find themselves, but they are not seeking God.
- Because until we know we need God, we do not want him – not the God of the Bible.
- We might want a "higher power", or a god of our own making, but we don't want the true God, or David and Paul would not have spoken as they did.

Maybe we need to redefine "seeker friendly" to mean that if you want to be among Christians who know our state before God and are still a bit discontent, then you are in the right place.



The Minor Prophets

- God's discipline on his people did serve one massive purpose – no longer would they involve themselves in idolatry.
- If we read Ezra and Nehemiah, we also see that Israel was revived coming out of captivity.
- Another post-exile note no longer are there two kingdoms the northern kingdom is gone for good so now Judah is called Israel.

- In the Bible, Babylon is a symbol for any human government that demands our loyalty to their beliefs..... i.e., their definitions of good and evil.
- In a sense we all live in a Babylonian world where the state could compel us to submit to their world view or be punished for not doing so.
- Fortunately, we have a model to follow when we understand we've become citizens of Babylon.

The Minor Prophets

- Unlike the Assyrians, the Babylonians did not always carry off those they conquered out of their homelands.
- It was around 604 BC that Nebuchadnezzar defeated the Egyptians who were helping King Zedekiah hold off Babylon.
- Following that defeat, the people of Judah were now captives in their own land, but uncooperative.

The Minor Prophets

- It was roughly 600 BC that the Babylonians started to deport the elites of Judah Daniel was part of this first wave of exiles.
- Then in 587 BC a larger deportation of Jews took place, leaving mostly the poor behind. If you could benefit Babylon, you were taken. (estimated 12,000 deported)
- The Jews left behind would be used as slaves of Babylon to tend vineyards and other crops.

- We should not be surprised to learn that not all of the exiled Jews returned to Judah. (Esther and Mordacai would have descended from such)
- Evidently, they got into Babylon and then Babylon got into them.
- We should not assume all Jews are spiritual giants, most were not and that has not changed unsaved people, Jew and Gentile, are lost people.

The Minor Prophets

- Jeremiah's words below, along with Daniel and three of his friends, show us for how to live in Babylon.
- Jeremiah 29:4 Thus says the Lord of hosts, the God of Israel, to all the exiles whom I have sent into exile from Jerusalem to Babylon: 5 Build houses and live in them; plant gardens and eat their produce. 6 Take wives and have sons and daughters; take wives for your sons, and give your daughters in marriage, that they may bear sons and daughters; multiply there, and do not decrease. 7 But seek the welfare of the city where I have sent you into exile, and pray to the Lord on its behalf, for in its welfare you will find your welfare.

The Minor Prophets

- Jeremiah tells Judah, and us by extension, to be good citizens in Babylon and Daniel, Shadrach, Meshach, and Abednego tell us to set boundaries.
- You could 1) fight the system, 2) embrace the system, or 3) you could live for the Lord within the system.
- In a sense, option #3 is what Jesus did he said, "render to Caesar what is his and render to God that which belongs to him".



The Minor Prophets

- Daniel knew of the promised Messiah, but like all Jews he did not know when he would come.
- God revealed to him in a dream that Babylon would fall and be followed by three more empires before the true King comes, so he knew Messiah's coming wasn't imminent.
- Babylon, Persia, Greece, and Rome (sort of twice), before the King of Kings comes.

The Minor Prophets

- A good strategy for us is to adopt the mindset of a foreigner –
- Heb 11:13 These all died in faith, not having received the things promised, but having seen them and greeted them from afar, and having acknowledged that they were strangers and exiles on the earth. 14 For people who speak thus make it clear that they are seeking a homeland. 15 If they had been thinking of that land from which they had gone out, they would have had opportunity to return. 16 But as it is, they desire a better country, that is, a heavenly one. Therefore God is not ashamed to be called their God, for he has prepared for them a city.

- Daniel and his friends looked forward to freedom, but even when they left Babylon, they were not free – they were in subjection to the Persians.
- They continued to work within the system to glorify God by being productive citizens while setting limits on what they would submit to.
- This is pretty much how it went for the Jew from Babylon on even when we get to Jesus' day they are still under a foreign empire, Rome.
